2013 Annual Meeting Minutes (DRAFT)
November 10, 2013

Immediately following the 10 AM Sunday service, at 11:05 AM, The Reverend Dr. Kurt Gerhard called to order the 2013 Annual Meeting of St. Patrick's Episcopal Church. He then nominated Candy Fowler to serve as Clerk for the meeting. The motion was seconded and unanimously approved by voice vote.

The minutes from the 2012 Annual Meeting were presented by Kurt. A motion to approve these minutes was made and seconded; the minutes were unanimously approved by voice vote.

Candy Fowler, chair of the 2013 Nominating Committee, was called to present the slate for 2014 Vestry members, Officers and Convention Delegates. Candy thanked the members of the Nominating Committee for their thoughtful and dedicated service. She said the Committee was very happy with the slate and the willingness of church members to serve; they received many more suggestions of excellent candidates than they had slots for.

Candy moved that the following slate of nominees for 2014 Parish Leadership be approved:

Ele Carpenter seconded the motion. There were no nominations from the floor, and the slate was approved unanimously by voice vote.

Kurt noted that the Report from the St. Patrick's Episcopal Day School was reprinted in the meeting bulletin.

In the absence of Treasurer Jay Sommerkamp, Marilyn Nowalk presented the Treasurer's Report, referring to the printed copy in the bulletin. She thanked the parish for responding generously to the March 2013 appeal for contributions to close the deficit, noting that the parish reached a \$12,000 surplus for the previous fiscal year. Although results for the first quarter of the current fiscal year were well below budget, such results are not unusual for the summer quarter. The parish will probably hold a fundraising auction in 2014, but the goal is to cover fundraisers through stewardship pledging without fundraisers. Marilyn noted that a new financial agreement between the Church and the Day School had been reached in 2013; she also thanked Jay Sommerkamp and Kurt Gerhard for their extensive work to clarify the parish's financial information.

Presenting the Rector's Report (printed in full in the bulletin), Kurt noted some highlights that will change the parish in various ways:

1. The departures of sexton Cleveland Barnes and Assistant to the Rector the Reverend Andrea Martin and the arrivals of their replacements, Federico Luna and the Reverend Loren Lasch, as well as deaths and baptisms within the parish.
2. The reallocation of space and costs between the Church and Day School, resulting in a savings of approximately \$65,000 for the Church.
3. Liturgical and spiritual changes including a new approach to Maundy Thursday service, the Bible Challenge, and a pilgrimage trip to St. John the Divine in New York.
4. A shift in the Haiti partnership to involve the Day School community more actively in hands-on work related to this ministry.
5. Planned improvement of the lighting in the nave using capital improvement funds.

Kurt said the parish is well positioned to start transforming St. Patrick's to meet existing needs. He asked parishioners to participate in the needs assessment survey to inform the staff's and Vestry's thinking on these issues.

Loren Lasch closed the meeting with a prayer. A motion to adjourn the annual meeting having been moved, seconded and passed, the meeting was adjourned at 11:25 AM.

Rector's Report – Annual Meeting 2014 – November 9, 2014

Dear Parishioners of St. Patrick's,

Grace and peace! Our time together is nearing five years. The first several years were spent listening and reorganizing St. Patrick's to reflect the current dynamics of this parish. This past year the Vestry and I have shifted our attention to attaining our longer-term goals. It started at the Vestry retreat in early February. The goals we set at the retreat: 1) Engage new people in the life of this parish; 2) deepen the spiritual lives of new and long-time members. I returned to the Vestry at the next regularly scheduled meeting with some strategies to attain that goal. Over the next several months, the Vestry's inputs were added to the mix and it was presented to the Parish at a special meeting on May 18, 2014.

After that meeting, the Vestry and I listened to the constructive feedback of parishioners. Many of their suggestions were added to the new Sunday morning plan. There are a few who felt that the Vestry and I forgot their needs. That was certainly not the goal of this new direction for St. Patrick's. I am very sad to lose the trust of members who call St. Patrick's their spiritual home. I hope that time will heal the pain that the new Sunday morning routine has caused, but I am convinced that what we are doing will bring more people into the life of this Parish, that spiritual lives will be deepened, and that new and long-time members' will have increased passion for the many ministries we do to fulfill God's kingdom.

In the sections below, I have reviewed that new Sunday morning strategy and the other major initiatives of the past year. It is an overview and not an exhaustive list of the activities of St. Patrick's Parish.

New Sunday Morning

Over the past several years, our Sunday attendance numbers and pledge amounts have fallen. This is not an unusual trend in churches nationwide. This is also not unusual in the Episcopal churches geographically near St. Patrick's. Sunday morning is the prime time for churches to engage new members. It is the most common time for parishioners to gather for a variety of programs and for common worship. Over the past 20 years, St. Patrick's has had two services on Sunday morning. The 10am service was a traditional service with music, Holy Eucharist. Sunday School for elementary age children ran concurrently. Over the past three years, Sunday School attendance decreased and it was becoming more of a challenge to recruit and retain Sunday School teachers. The responsibility of sharing the faith with our children was falling on the shoulders of a few high-quality teachers and the clergy. The average attendance at the 10am service was holding at approximately 145 people.

The other Sunday morning service was a quiet and intimate contemplative service in the All Saints' Chapel. The members who attended that service were faithful parishioners with a heart for prayer, conversation, and service. The average attendance at the 8am service was four people.

1. Shift the service times to 9am and 11am.

9am – A service aimed at families with young children

The biggest shift was the service at 9am. I visited several churches, read extensively, and attended conferences on how best to develop a service that children under the age of 12 would find engaging and enjoyable, but would also be meaningful to adults.

- Less formal – the service begins in a less formal way and the preaching is done from the floor and often involves activities that encourage participation. The prayers and the readings are Episcopal, but they have been carefully chosen to serve the spiritual lives of our target demographic.
- Projections – two projectors were installed into the nave and the 9am service can be totally free of paper although we do have a printed order of service. The words of the prayers, song lyrics, announcements, and sermon examples are projected for everyone. This process has been a learning curve for me and for our staff, but it is the cutting edge of Episcopal worship.
- Music – Dr. Adele Lynch has integrated new music into the 9am service. The music is simpler with piano or guitar, but she has also invited the children's choirs to sing as part of the service on a more regular basis. Children have also been encouraged to play instruments such as the bells and timpani.

Review – After nine weeks, the 9am service is doing well. Many parishioners have chosen to make 9am their new worship time. We are still smoothing out the routine and are looking for feedback. I have heard feedback from parents reporting that their children are paying attention and enjoying church. The average attendance is 59 people (See attendance chart).

11am – St. Patrick's Traditional

The 11am service is essentially what used to be the 10am service, but without concurrent Sunday School. The music and the liturgy are the same. The biggest change is that fewer people are sitting in the balcony. This is because most of the people who regularly found themselves in the balcony are attending the 9am service.

Review – The service is definitely more intimate and the average age is higher (mostly because there are fewer children). It is still a rich spiritual experience for people of all ages. The average attendance is 86 (See attendance chart).

2. 10am Breakfast and Education

Breakfast

Fellowship is an important part of St. Patrick's. There was a fear that the shift in service times would be at the cost of the multi-generational fellowship. The breakfast between the two service times is the part of the strategy that attempts to alleviate the concern. On the first Sunday of the month, a team of parishioners prepares a hot breakfast. It is hard to count the number of people eating the meal, but seeing people of all ages sitting down for discussion and food seems to be working. On the other Sundays, a continental style breakfast is available.

Education

We are offering at least two adult classes or forums every week and Sunday School for children with a new curriculum (see the Assistant to the Rector report). The attendance is higher than in recent years for adults and children. We remain far

below the number of participants in children's Sunday School of approximately five years ago.

Sunday Morning Prayer

The parishioners who worshiped at 8am have continued to gather in the All Saints' Chapel for Morning Prayer on Sundays. A member of the clergy team celebrates the Holy Eucharist on the first Sunday of the month. The average attendance in the first nine weeks is over 5 people each week. These attendance numbers are higher than attendance last year over the same period of time.

Wednesday Healing Service

I heard feedback that we were not meeting the needs for contemplative service and services with healing prayer and anointing with oil. I announced the beginning of a new service beginning in September on Wednesday at 5:30pm in the All Saints' Chapel. In addition to those who could be in attendance in person, we also invited people to listen to the prayers online. Attendance at 5:30 was low. The average was two people (including the member of the clergy team). A couple of weeks ago, the service moved to 11am, immediately after the Wednesday morning Bible Study. In the ensuing two weeks, attendance is has averaged six parishioners. It is also available on the online radio station.

Lunches with the Rector

In August, September and October, I have shared lunch and conversation with 30 parishioners or prospective parishioners. A generous parishioner provided the funds for this opportunity to build stronger relationships. I will continue the lunches this week and through December.

Upkeep of the Parish facilities

The Nave is nearly 30 years old and it had never been painted from top to bottom until this summer. The painting was our biggest project since the last annual meeting. It cost \$20,000, which was financed through our plant reserve.

Thanks to a gift from Bob Brookhiser and Candy Fowler, our exterior cross was repainted by Tom Thomas, the original artist. The cross is made of mahogany wood and the art is based on a cross that once hung in the Nave of the old St. Patrick's in the 1950's and currently hangs in the Church Library.

This year, I will ask the Vestry to consider recarpeting the main corridor of the building and refinishing the wood floor in the Nave. The 4700 Whitehaven building is one of our most important assets. It allows us to better fulfill God's mission. We have to take care of it just like we take care of our homes.

Conclusion

I hope this overview provides a glimpse of the work of this Parish over the past year. Thousands of people have worshiped in this space both on Sunday and during the week. St. Patrick's is a vibrant spiritual home for many. Please let me know your ideas for your parish home. We continue to journey together in faith, welcoming all in love, and serving the world in thanksgiving.

**DAY SCHOOL REPORT FOR THE NOVEMBER 9, 2014
ANNUAL MEETING OF ST. PATRICK'S EPISCOPAL PARISH**

1. We opened school (for all but our Nursery School students, who have a different opening schedule) on Tuesday, September 2, with an enrollment of 515 students, down slightly from the 2013-2014 school year but still a robust enrollment for our Nursery through Grade 8 program.
2. This year's enrollment includes 68 new students and 40 new families. Most of those new students, 49, are in the Nursery School (Nursery and PK), while 17 are in our Lower School (Kindergarten to Grade 3) and two are in our Upper School (Grades 4 through 8). There are also nine new, and two returning, members of our faculty and staff.
3. Among the new faculty and staff is the Rev. Katie Solter, the Assistant to the Rector and Day School Chaplain, appointed following a thorough search process last spring that included Kurt Gerhard and Peter Barrett as well as a number of representatives of Church and Day School.
4. The 2014-2015 school year represents the second year of a two-campus format for our Grades 7 and 8 program, with math and science classes offered on the Whitehaven Campus and the balance of the classes on the MacArthur Campus. Faculty and students adjusted beautifully to the arrangement during the last school year, with certain refinements introduced along the way. This year's opening featured a new director of the Grades 7 and 8 program—longtime Grade 8 humanities teacher and past Day School parent Ann Adams—and the introduction of a one-to-one Chromebook program for students, which relies heavily on the increased use of our Learning Management System, Haiku. Other programmatic innovations in Grades 7 and 8 include the introduction of a dedicated STEM class and regular classes teaching programming.
5. Eight Day School teachers and administrators are presenting at signature independent education conferences around the country this fall, and a ninth presented at an international librarians conference in Belgium. Their participation reflects the strong professional culture here at St. Patrick's and the leadership our faculty and staff offer in their respective fields. Presenting from Brussels to Anaheim, with Baltimore and Bethesda in between, the St. Patrick's educators have participated in conferences sponsored by the National Association of Episcopal Schools (NAES), the Association of Independent Maryland and D.C. Schools (AIMS), the Mid-Atlantic Episcopal School Association (MAESA), and the European Council of International Schools. As part of St. Patrick's faculty and administrative participation, as well as leadership, in important professional conversations, several individuals will be members of visiting teams for the purposes of accreditation at AIMS member-schools.

6. With respect to important professional conversations, the Day School had the first of two Professional Days for the 2014-2015 school year on Friday. One focus was our ongoing work in the area of equity and diversity—in this instance, how to support children in having meaningful and courageous conversations about topics, such as race, that are often difficult for adults. The other focus addressed our shared theme of how to make the Day School program an even more student-centered one—with the presenter working with faculty in creating inquiry-based lessons that take “students from the classroom to the real world and back again.”
7. The Day School has a vigorous after-school athletics program, including interscholastic and intramural sports, for students in Grades 3 through 8. During the fall season, recently completed, we fielded six soccer teams and a cross country team to compete in the Capital Athletic Conference (CAC) at the varsity (Grades 7 and 8) and junior varsity (Grades 5 and 6) levels. The junior varsity (A) boys and girls soccer teams won their respective CAC Tournament Championships, finishing their seasons with records of 11-0 (girls) and 9-1-1 (boys). The varsity girls finished in second place during the regular season and in fourth place in the tournament, while the boys finished in fourth place during the regular season and in third place in the tournament, the strongest varsity boys season in history. Subsequent seasons will bring healthy competition in basketball (winter) and lacrosse and track and field (spring).

Assistant to the Rector’s Report – Annual Meeting 2014 – November 9, 2014

Sunday School – Our new Sunday School program has gotten off to a great start, using a fantastic new curriculum called Spark: Activate Faith, which helps the children engage with Scripture through fun and thought provoking activities. Our children in grades K-2 are being led by Tricia Duncan, Trish Heatherman, Seth Garber, and Ellie Gall (one of our GW students). Our 3rd-5th Grade class is being led by Lalie Tongour and Carol Groh. I am incredibly grateful to these wonderful leaders for their ministry with our children!

Youth Ministry - On Sunday mornings our youth in grades 6-12 are invited to join me in the Parish Meeting Room for fellowship and discussion. Our hope for this time with the youth is to help them come together as a community within the larger parish community of St. Patrick’s. This group meeting is in addition to the Sunday evening Classy for youth in grades 7-8. Classy has gotten off to a rousing start this year...after handbell practice the youth gather for dinner and wonderful theological discussion around topics like discipleship, and they have a great time! This Spring we will have Confirmation classes for those in Grade 9 and above who wish to be Confirmed.

College Ministry - We have been delighted to welcome GW students to our services each week! We have had some new students join us, as well as students who have been here in previous years (and who now live on the Foggy Bottom campus but still want to be a part of St. Patrick’s!) Students will gather at St. Patrick’s for dessert and Compline later this month. This year we have been invited to join a new neighborhood program called Homes Away from Home, which is designed to pair up students and local families to provide students with a safe haven from the stresses of college life.

Assistance Ministry – Each Tuesday at 11am St. Patrick’s welcomes guests who are in need of food assistance. Due to the generosity of parishioners who donate to our discretionary fund, we are able to hand out grocery cards to our neighbors who cannot otherwise afford food. We are able to help with grocery cards every six months. We also provide bags of nonperishable food and give out information about Samaritan Ministry. Karen Melchar is incredibly instrumental in making this wonderful ministry happen!

Director of Music’s Report – Annual Meeting 2014 – November 9, 2014

Music at St. Patrick’s

We are blessed with a strong corps of volunteers – adults, children and youth, who help provide a variety of musical offerings to our community throughout the year.

- Our Cantoris Choir (Adults) has welcomed several new (or returning) members in the last couple of seasons to bring the number of potential singers on any given Sunday to 24. Highlights are the pre-service concerts on Christmas Eve, Easter and All Saints.
- High School singers (which we deem “Nova Lux” meaning new light), about 6 singers, join the Cantoris Choir periodically. Our young women’s ensemble at Christmas Eve was amazing!
- The Classy (7th/8th graders) is a vibrant group that meets most Sunday evenings for Handbell rehearsal, dinner and discussion and currently has 10 players. They rocked on “Lord of the Dance” and Irish music for Feast Day last spring!
- Our Jubilate Deo (3rd/6th graders) has 8 regular members with 4-6 others who may join occasionally throughout the year. Mini-musicals rule! “Acorns to Oaks” and “GPS” last year.
- Our youngest musicians, Music in Motion K-2nd graders, meet monthly with varying attendance of 6-10 kids from a pool of about 16 interested families. They helped us kick-off our 9am in September!
- Family Choir is our “show up and sing” Sunday morning group which ranges in attendance from 8-25. Awesome!
- We also have a “Drum Corps” of musicians who play the Timpani during services. 8-10 people take advantage of this opportunity each year. These players have the power!
- Regular guest musicians round out our music program year. We especially enjoy Jazz Sunday, Christmas Eve Brass, and the regular contributions of Trumpeter Fred Irby, Cellist Erin Espinoza and Percussionist Scott Tiemann.

The challenge this fall has been to develop a program of music that serves both the new 9am and the traditional 11am service well. Your Director of Music welcomes your input!
